## HomeWord 1

od has revealed Himself to us in the words of the Bible. As God's only written revelation to man, we are called to study diligently what has been revealed and apply it to the way we live our lives.

We trust that God has revealed those things that we need to live lives that honor Him. The apostle Peter relates this idea to us in 2 Peter 1:2-4 when he tells us that "all things that pertain to life and godliness" have been given to us "through the knowledge of Him." How do we know about God? We know primarily by what He has revealed to us in His Word. The doctrine known as the sufficiency of Scripture doesn't mean that the Bible is an exhaustive manual on everything, but that its principles are sufficient to guide us in the different situations we face.

In order to study His word diligently, we first observe the text by asking questions and allowing the text to answer. We ask questions such as who, what, when, where, why, and how. Then we interpret what we've read by asking the question, "What does this passage mean?" And finally, we apply the Word to our lives by asking, "What does God want to change in my life?"

This simple method is referred to as inductive Bible study. The purpose of studying in this way is so that we can honestly see what the Bible says rather than trying to make the Bible say what we would like it to say.
