

he gospel—redemption of sinners through the promised Messiah—is woven like a scarlet thread throughout the Bible—like an arrow pointing to something wonderful that will surely happen in the future. As we look at the prophet Micah, we will see that he was one of the prophets of God who had the privilege of announcing the coming Messiah.

Micah was a contemporary of Isaiah, ministering to both Israel and Judah. He preached in the days of Jotham, Ahaz, and Hezekiah, kings of Judah. He prophesied from around 760 to 710 BC. His message of the future included revelations of the Messiah, the Savior—who He was and how He would be identified.

In Micah 5 we see four characteristics regarding the coming Messiah. First, in Micah 5:2, the Messiah would be born in Bethlehem. Second, the Messiah would come from the tribe of Judah. Third, the Messiah would be the eternal Ruler. And fourth, in Micah 5:4, the Messiah would act as a shepherd who would feed His flock. These prophecies were all fulfilled, and God confirmed the fulfillment of them in other parts of Scripture.

Micah continued with the prophecy that brought the people of his time hope—and still brings hope today. God would one day pardon iniquity and pass over the transgressions of His children for good. He would not retain His anger against sin forever. God would have compassion on His children and would cast all their sins into the depths of the sea (Micah 7:18–20). This could be accomplished ONLY through the finished work of Jesus Christ on the Cross. And it is available to all who will turn from their sins and trust in this precious Messiah, the Savior Jesus Christ.

Suppose you heard someone ask, "What's the big deal about Bible prophecies coming true?" **What would you say?**

Well, it is a big deal. You see, there are hundreds of Bible prophecies that have occurred just the way the prophets described. This fact alone can give us complete confidence that the Word of God is true. There are people who try to explain this accuracy by saying the Bible was changed, and prophecies were written after the events actually happened. But research has proven that the ancient prophetic manuscripts were written before the events they prophesied about. How could all these prophecies be so accurate? The only explanation is that the Lord gave the knowledge of these future events to His prophets and then inspired the recording of His Word in the Bible!


