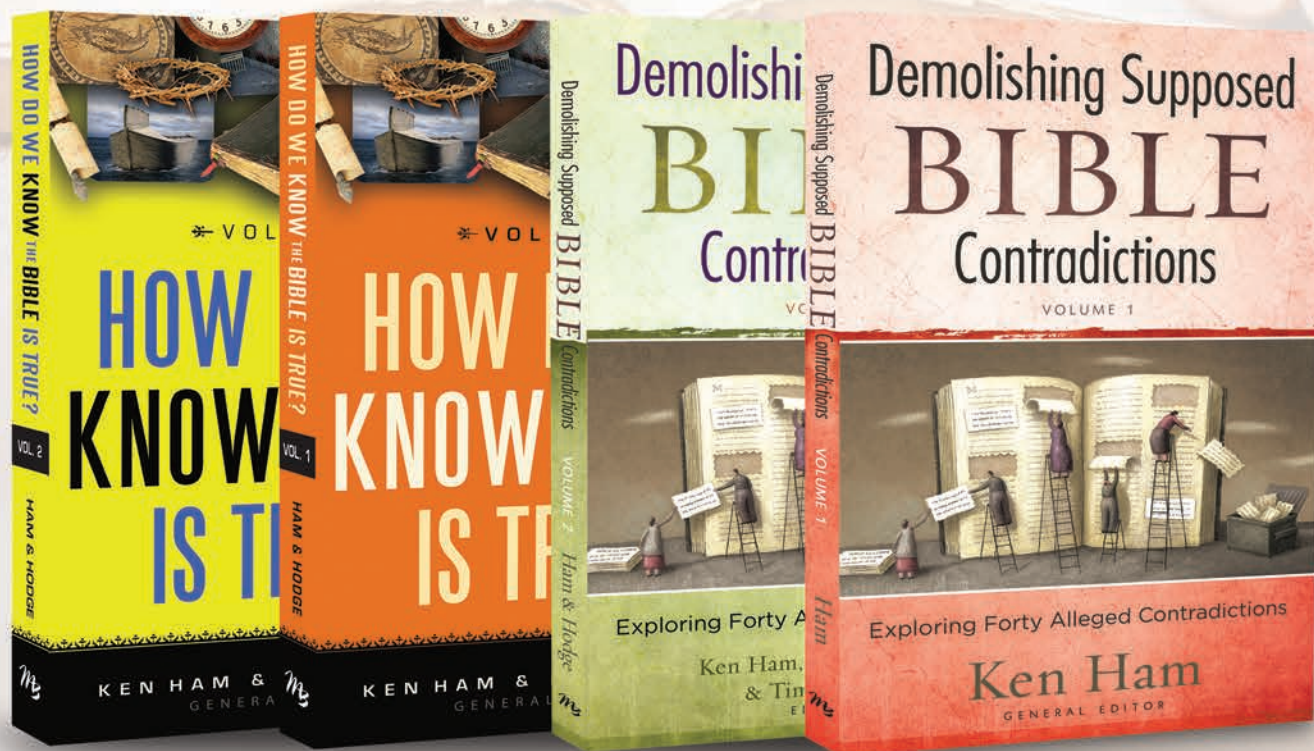

It is always the prerogative of a parent/educator to assess student grades however he or she might deem best. The following is only a suggested guideline based on the material presented through this course:

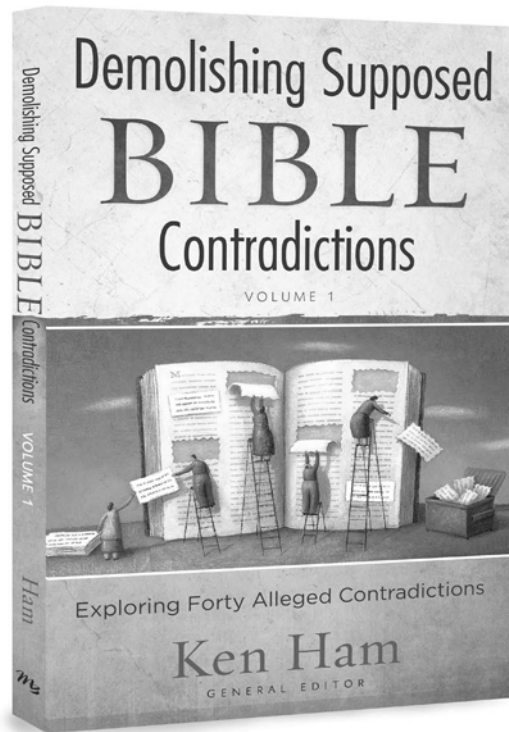
1. Worksheets within the course are worth 100 points each.

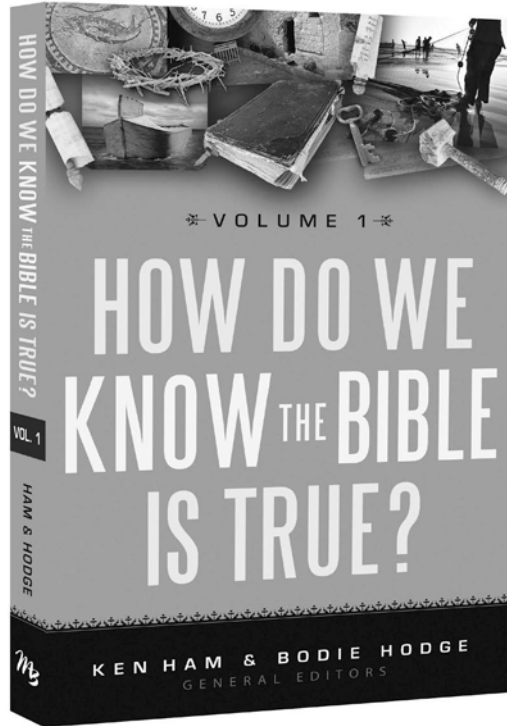

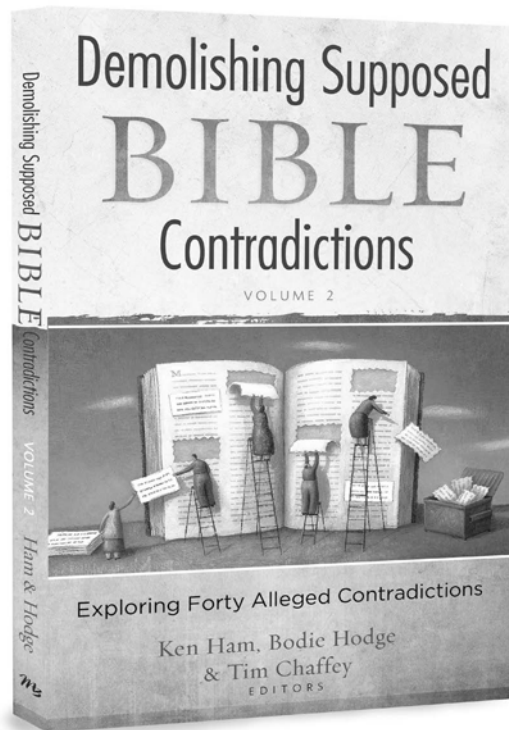

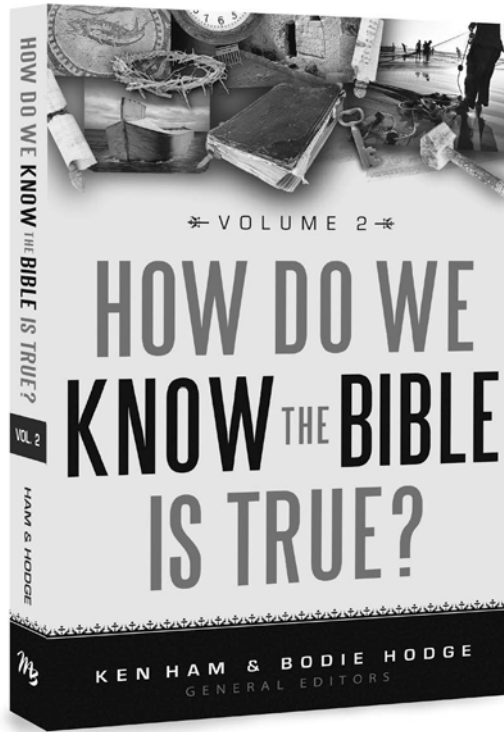

Demolishing Supposed Bible Contractions 1 — Worksheet Answer Keys

Introduction – Worksheet 1

If the Bible is true, then certainly it is not a problem for an all-powerful God to make the sun go backward, to walk on water, to make a donkey talk, or to raise the dead. These things may seem counter-intuitive, but they are not *illogical*. They are merely a *psychological* problem for some. These kinds of assertions need no refutation because they are not *logical* objections, merely psychological opinions.

Introduction – Worksheet 2

Most alleged biblical contradictions are not even “apparent” contradictions because there is no necessary conflict between the two propositions. For example, the statements, “Jesus is descended from Adam” and “Jesus is descended from Noah” are not contradictory since both are true. A contradiction is a proposition and its negation (symbolically written, “A and not A”) at the same time and in the same relationship.

Introduction – Worksheet 3

In such cases, it is often helpful to consult several different versions of the Bible to see the range of possible interpretations, or to consult a Hebrew/Greek lexicon. Recall that we should always attempt to honor the intentions of the author, and in many cases this entails a careful study of the word or phrase in question. It would be disingenuous to accuse the Bible of a contradiction in an English translation when there is no contradiction in the original language.

Introduction – Worksheet 4

This is because the law of non-contradiction is based on the biblical worldview. When the critic accepts that a contradiction cannot possibly be true, he has implicitly presumed that the Bible must be true.

Genesis – Worksheet 1

The passage doesn't indicate that Abel *ate* of the sacrifice, so there is really no reason to assume he did. When God sacrificed animals to cover Adam and Eve's sin, there is no indication that they ate either, and since Abel mimicked what God did, then

there is no reason to believe that he would have eaten from the sacrifice.

Genesis – Worksheet 2

Their actions on that day were what gave them the final death sentence — it was coming, and they would surely die as a result of their actions. Therefore, the day in Genesis 2:17 was referring to when they ate (disobeyed), and not the day they died.

Genesis – Worksheet 3

Genesis 1 is perfectly worded for what the author wanted to communicate. It says nothing more than God created the sky and its constituent elements, while remaining completely silent about what those elements were.

Genesis – Worksheet 4

The original Hebrew word for replenish in Genesis 1:28 is *male*. This word simply means “fill” and is translated that way in the King James elsewhere (e.g., Genesis 1:22). So neither the Hebrew word nor the English word chosen by the King James Version translators meant, at that time, “refill.” The translators' choice of *replenish* may have been meant to convey something akin to “fill up” (i.e., to “make replete [full]”).

Genesis – Worksheet 5

Noah was 600 when the floodwaters came on the earth, and two years later Shem was 100. Therefore, Shem had to be born to Noah when he was 502. We are not sure of Ham's exact age in Scripture, but he had to be born after Shem. Thus, Genesis 5:32 introduces us to Noah's sons all together when Noah began having them, and other passages give more detail about their birth order and age.

Genesis – Worksheet 6

Demolishing Supposed Bible Contractions 2 — Worksheet Answer Keys

Intro & Genesis – Worksheet 1

In Genesis 2:5–6 the writer set up the narrative and informed the reader of what was to come. These verses provide a description of the world on day 6 before God created Adam. The grasses, fruit trees, and seed-yielding herbs were created on day 3 (with the exception of those within the garden).

Genesis – Worksheet 1

If you look at Genesis 1:27–31, you find that God created both Adam and Eve on day 6 (male *and* female). Genesis 2:7–25 provides more detail about the sixth day of creation than Genesis 1:24–31 does. The fact that they're both actually describing the same events easily explains any alleged contradiction.

Genesis – Worksheet 2

All of the activities described for each of the days of the creation week could easily have been accomplished within 12 hours of the respective days. It is only when one adds timing elements to the text that the sixth day seems to describe too many events.

Genesis – Worksheet 3

The command about not eating from the tree of knowledge of good and evil was given first and served as an exception clause. Although it appears in the Bible in Genesis 2:17, this instruction was delivered prior to the creation of Eve. In Genesis 1, God's instruction about food occurred after the creation of Eve, so Adam was already fully aware of the exception.

Genesis – Worksheet 4

The language indicates that a gradient of drying has occurred, and it is clearly not a restatement of the same degree or concept of dryness. Therefore, the use of *charab* in this context indicates that the Flood waters had largely drained from the continents, though the ground would have still been saturated. *Yabesh*, on the other hand, indicates that continents were truly dry near the end of the following month.

Genesis – Worksheet 5

God delegated the announcement of destruction to the angels. The principle holds true because God

is the one with the power to enable the action and authority to order it.

Genesis – Worksheet 6

The Hebrew word used for “only” is *yachiyd*, which means “unique” or “only begotten” (special). So the Hebrew clarifies that Isaac is indeed the special, unique, only begotten son of Abraham. Isaac was the son of promise. So this answers the alleged contradiction.

Exodus-Deuteronomy – Worksheet 1

God often gave new names to people, such as Jacob becoming Israel or Abram becoming Abraham and so on. So having more than one name is no contradiction at all.

Exodus-Deuteronomy – Worksheet 2

There are at least six reasonable explanations for this apparent contradiction, including: it does not mention goats the first time, God warned those who feared Him, “servants” may not have referred to Egyptians, it is not mentioned how much time passed in between the 5th and 7th plagues, “all” does not always directly mean “all,” and finally, the plague took place in the fields.

Exodus-Deuteronomy – Worksheet 3

We must consider the recipients of war and the recipients of peace. God has never promised peace to the wicked. In fact, He has stated exactly the opposite. “‘There is no peace,’ says the LORD, ‘for the wicked’” (Isaiah 48:22). The promises of peace in Romans 15 and elsewhere are given to God's people alone.

Exodus-Deuteronomy – Worksheet 4

Animal sacrifices could only cover sins; they could not remove them. The passage from Hebrews 10 draws a contrast between the animal sacrifices and Christ's sacrifice. The former could never take away sins, but when Christ shed His own blood, it was a once-and-for-all sacrifice that removes sins.

Exodus-Deuteronomy – Worksheet 5

Therefore, Christians should rightly use the money God gives us, but not love it, since it is only temporary.

God’s rules to man can change at various covenants (but God’s character has never changed). With regards to various laws, there are also some changes, but it may not be as “cut and dried” as the example above regarding food.
