Scriptural Background

The New Testament is the history of Jesus Christ the Messiah and the founding of his church. It spans approximately 90 years, beginning shortly before Jesus' birth and ending with Christ's Revelation to John. But how do we know the New Testament is true?

First, the Holy Spirit empowered the apostles to recall, write, and interpret the life, words, and deeds of Jesus. Jesus said the Helper would come and would teach his apostles all things and bring to their remembrance the things Jesus said to them (John 14:26). The apostles would receive and record special revelation through the Holy Spirit who would guide them into all truth (John 16:13).

Second, the apostles were ordained by Jesus to spread the message of the gospel, and we have the writings from them and their close associates. Peter verified this emphatically when he wrote that they were eyewitnesses of Jesus' majesty and heard the voice of God acknowledge the beloved Son with whom he was well pleased (2 Peter 1:16–18).

As the New Testament letters began to be gathered and read throughout the church, we find evidence that they were already being described as "Scripture." For instance, in 1 Timothy 5:18, Paul quoted from Deuteronomy 25:4 and Luke 10:7, indicating that he considered Luke's writings to be on par with those of Moses. The Holy Spirit directed these various writers to produce the inspired original manuscripts of the New Testament (2 Peter 1:19–21).

These writings were then spread throughout Europe, Asia, and Africa as copies were transferred among local churches. The collection of writings was acknowledged and used as a source of teaching by early leaders including those we call the church fathers. In the first and second centuries, there was some disagreement about which writings should be included in the canon—the official list of the inspired texts—but these differences were discussed and resolved as the true writings from the Holy Spirit were made clear and acknowledged.

Now God's Word is closed. We can be confident that the 27 books of the New Testament combined with the 39 books of the Old Testament is the completed Word of God. God clearly warns us that we are NOT to add to his Word or take away from what is written (Revelation 22:18–19).

Historical/Apologetics Background

Although we do not have the original inspired manuscripts, or autographs (the documents penned by the authors), of the New Testament, we do have many documents that were copied from those originals. But if all we have today are copies of copies, wouldn't there be a few copying mistakes?

Yes, but having lots of copies is a good thing. We have so many copies of the New Testament writings that we can compare them and understand where the errors were made during the copying and what the originals said. Most of the errors, which are called variants, are very easy to correct or are insignificant.

For example, sometimes phrases got switched (e.g., Christ Jesus vs. Jesus Christ) or there are variant spellings (like honor and honour in English). Some areas are more difficult to deal with, but we have thousands of documents to compare to help us understand what the original manuscripts said. This is called textual criticism and gives us great confidence in the Bible we already trust by faith.

Manuscripts were written on animal skins, papyrus, and various early forms of paper. That means that the originals would have deteriorated, and the manuscripts we have are in various states of decay, with only a few being complete. The printing press allowed copies to be made much more quickly and with fewer errors, but these are not technically considered manuscripts since they were not written by hand. There are over 5,800 partial or complete manuscripts in the original Greek language, around 10,000 in Latin, and 9,000 in various languages like Coptic, Armenian, and Syriac, and new manuscripts are still being discovered.

The historicity of the Bible is obvious to anyone willing to fairly investigate it. It has been confirmed countless times by archaeology and other sciences. The Bible claims to be the Word of God, and we can trust it and the life-giving message of the gospel it contains.

LESSON 1

Prepare

Introductory Activity

Say: Today, we're going to meet Mrs. C. She and her friends, Dr. P, Archie the archaeologist, Matthew, and Maisie will be helping us learn about the 7 C's of History throughout the year. Let's see what Mrs. C has to teach us today.

Play the UNIT 1 OPENER: MRS. C AND THE WORD OF GOD VIDEO on myAnswers.

Say: Mrs. C taught us about the 7 C's of History and how they help us understand the Bible's chronology. God's Word tells the truth about events that have happened, are happening now, and will happen, and we can trust it to tell us the truth about God and the gospel of Jesus Christ. We're going to learn more about it today.

Study

God's Word Inspired

Use the following information to help students understand why we can trust the New Testament. Before class, write 2 Timothy 3:16–17 on your instructional board.

- Have students open their Bibles to the New Testament and mark it with their 7 C'S BOOKMARKS.
- Give each student a sheet of paper. Have students copy 2 Timothy 3:16–17 from the board. Explain that a **manuscript** is a handwritten document. **Say:** *Manuscript literally means "written by hand," and that's how the New Testament was first written—by hand by different writers.*
- Explain that the authors of the New Testament wrote their eyewitness record about Jesus on animal skins, papyrus, or other kinds of paper. We don't have the very first manuscripts anymore, but when people today read and compare all the manuscript copies, they can figure out the message of the original authors.

- Emphasize that we don't have the original manuscripts anymore by erasing the verse on the board. Have two students collect the copies the class made of the verse. Have students use the copies to confirm the original text and write the verse back up on the board.
- Reinforce that the manuscript copies of the New Testament can be compared to each other to determine what the original said.
- Have students read the sentences on the TOPIC
 1 STUDY PAGES: "God preserved thousands of New Testament manuscript copies. We know what the original message said by comparing copies."
- Say: Many people wonder how we can know the New Testament is true. Let's read what Jesus told his apostles before his death when he knew he wouldn't be with them much longer.
- Read John 14:25–26 aloud. Ask: Whom did Jesus mention the Father would send in his name? The Helper, the Holy Spirit. Ask: What two things would the Holy Spirit do? Teach them in all things and help them remember what Jesus had said. Explain that the Holy Spirit would be a teacher and a helper as the disciples wrote about Jesus' time on earth.
- Read John 16:13 aloud. Say: This Spirit of truth is the Holy Spirit whom Jesus was talking about in John 14:26. Say: Jesus was telling his apostles that the Holy Spirit would speak what Jesus had spoken and guide them to know the truth and to understand things that would happen later. Have students read the sentences on the TOPIC 1 STUDY PAGES: "The Holy Spirit helped the writers of the New Testament remember what Jesus said and write the truth."
- Remind students that the Holy Spirit is one of the three persons of the Trinity. The Trinity refers to the three persons in the one true God. **Ask:** Who are the three persons of the Trinity? *God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Spirit.*
- Have students look at the ATTRIBUTES OF GOD POSTER. Ask: Which attribute of God means that he knows everything? Omniscient. Ask: Which attribute of God means that he does everything perfectly without mistakes? Wise.
- Read 2 Timothy 3:16–17 aloud. Say: God-breathed means that God directed the writing of the Bible perfectly, without mistakes. Jesus himself, God the Son, promised the apostles that God the Father would

send the Holy Spirit to help them write the truth so that people like us could know all about him. Since God doesn't make mistakes and since he was the one guiding these writers, we know the New Testament is true. Have students read the sentence on the TOPIC 1 STUDY PAGES: "We know the New Testament is true because it is God-breathed."

[Note: Do not send Study Pages home until entire topic is complete. This is true for all topics.]

7 C'S CHRONOLOGY

- Remind students of the 7 C's of History using the 7 C'S OF HISTORY EXPANDED TIMELINE.
- Ask: Which "C's" took place in the Old Testament? *Creation, Corruption, Catastrophe, and Confusion.*
- Ask: Which "C's" are about the message of the New Testament that the Messiah has come? *Christ and Cross.*
- Ask: Which "C" is still in the future? *Consummation.*


Understand

Find the Missing Word

Divide students into pairs. Give each pair a set of SCROLL CARDS to cut out. Explain that some cards have the sentence, and some cards have the missing word. Have the pairs race to match the missing words to the sentences.

LESSON 2

Prepare

Study

Eyewitness Testimonies

Use the following information to help students understand how the New Testament came to be.

- Remind students that the Holy Spirit guided the authors of the New Testament to remember what Jesus said and write the truth.
- Explain that one way to confirm that something is true is to hear from someone who saw it happen. This person is called an eyewitness.
- Explain that the apostles John and Peter were disciples and very close friends of Jesus. They were both eyewitnesses to Jesus' life on earth.
- Have two students come to the front with their Bibles to play the apostles John and Peter. Interview them with a "microphone" (paper towel tube or similar) using the following questions.
 - » Ask: John, were you an eyewitness of Jesus? Have "John" read John 19:35 aloud. Explain that when someone gives a testimony, he is telling others what happened to him or what he saw with his own eyes. Ask: How did John describe the testimony he wrote about Jesus? It was true.
 - » **Ask:** John, why did you write down your testimony about Jesus? Have "John" read John 20:31 aloud.
 - » Ask: Peter, were you an eyewitness of Jesus? Have "Peter" read 2 Peter 1:16 aloud. Explain that a myth is a made-up story. Peter was saying that what he and the other New Testament writers wrote weren't made-up stories—it was all true. Ask: Who was Peter writing about? The Lord Jesus Christ. Ask: What did Peter say about himself and the other disciples? They were what? Eyewitnesses of Jesus' majesty.
 - » Have "John" and "Peter" return to their seat.

- Have students finish the first sentence on the TOPIC 1 STUDY PAGES: John wrote his (testimony) so others would believe Jesus is the Son of God.
- Have students finish the second sentence on the **TOPIC 1 STUDY PAGES**: Peter and the other apostles were *(eyewitnesses)* of Jesus' life, death, and resurrection.
- Explain that we can trust the New Testament writings about Jesus because eyewitnesses, or friends of eyewitnesses, wrote about the things that really happened. They walked and talked and ate and prayed with Jesus. They saw his life, death, and resurrection. They were Jesus' friends.
- Say: There was another writer of the New Testament who didn't start out as a friend of Jesus. Saul, later the Apostle Paul, hated and persecuted people who believed—until Jesus appeared to him. Then he repented and became a faithful follower of Jesus, preaching the gospel and starting churches in many cities. Paul was chosen by God to spread the gospel, teach the early believers in the churches he started, and write many books in the New Testament (called epistles).
- Read 2 Peter 3:15–16 aloud. **Ask:** What word does Peter use to describe Paul's writings? *Scriptures*. Explain that Scriptures is another word for the Bible, the Word of God. By calling Paul's letters "Scriptures," Peter was saying that God the Holy Spirit helped Paul write the truth just he had helped the other apostles. Have students finish the sentence on the **TOPIC 1 STUDY PAGES**: Paul was specially chosen by (*God*) to write many books in the New Testament.
- Say: We can be sure the New Testament is true! The authors of the New Testament were either eyewitnesses to Jesus' life, like John and Peter, or close friends of the apostles. Others, like Paul, were specially chosen by God, who guided them to write what he wanted them to. All of them were guided by the Holy Spirit and testified that the words they wrote were true. Have students finish the sentence on the TOPIC 1 STUDY PAGES: All the writers of the New Testament were guided by the Holy Spirit to write the (truth).

The Bible is God's Word, and God cannot lie. There are many forms of evidence that confirm the truth of the Bible such as fulfilled prophecies, the reliability of the ancient manuscripts, archaeological evidence, and the testimonies of changed lives.

Assess

To assess students' understanding of the topic, consider the following options.

- Evaluate students' **TOPIC 1 PRACTICE PAGES**.
- Ask students the Cornerstone Questions.
- Complete the UNIT 1 MEMORY VERSE 1 PRACTICE PAGES.



- Reinforce the impact of eyewitness testimony. Have students write a 2–3 sentence eyewitness testimony of something they've experienced (vacation, birthday, activity, performance, etc.). Divide the class into groups and allow students to share with each other their testimonies. Choose a student in each group to read Peter's testimony to Cornelius in Acts 10:39–42 aloud. Emphasize that the New Testament was written by eyewitnesses to Jesus' life on earth.
- To help students connect the lesson topics to an everyday situation, read aloud the JUSTIN & JESSIE STORY: MAPS & MYSTERIES. Emphasize that God preserved multiple copies of the Bible so that people can compare them and know with confidence what God had written for mankind.



Mixed-Up Messages Game

The Bible was written over a period of roughly 1,500 years by 40 different authors, yet miraculously tells one cohesive message. Emphasize the reliability of God's Word by playing the classic game of telephone. Have students form a circle of chairs. Whisper a phrase to one of the students and have them whisper what they heard to the person next to them. Once the phrase has made its way around the circle, have the last student say aloud what they heard. The phrase should have gone through a few changes depending on the size of the class. Reinforce that humans can make so many mistakes when communicating messages, but God didn't make any mistakes when he guided the writers of the Bible.

Scripture Scrolls Snack

Reinforce that God preserved thousands of New Testament manuscript copies by having students make the **SCRIPTURE SCROLLS SNACK** on myAnswers.

Language Arts: Fiction and Nonfiction

Help students see that the Bible is different from any other book by comparing it to other genres of writing. Explain that writing can be divided into two main categories, fiction and nonfiction. Identify characteristics of fiction and nonfiction and provide samples of both types of books that students have read, such as a fairy tale and a biography.

Hold up the Bible and emphasize that the Bible is nonfiction—it tells the true Word of God and records information about real people, places, and events. It is the only book written by God, it contains true information about events that have happened, are happening now, or will happen later. Have students write a nonfiction informational paragraph about how the Bible is different from all other books.
